## POST OFFICE RELEASES

RELIEF No 2 continues in use in KAVIENG
RELIEF No 3 continues in use in SAMARAI
RELIEF No 1 is intended for use in MINJ when that Post Office opens for business. No date available as yet.

PAPUA and NEW GUINEA CHIT CHAT
The only items of interest brought to our notice this month are some irregularities in dates originating from one or more of the Port Moresby post marks. They are:

An envelope bearing the current $3 \frac{1}{2} d$ Papua \& New Guinea stamp, and clearly post marked 7 May 42 , and two envelopes bearing "Nov 56" and "Sept 65" post marks.

It has now been found that one of the older Port Moresby post markers had a loose date pin.

Under normal Post Office system it is only possible for these irregularities to occur through a mechanical defect, as they use a Post Mark Day Book and as the post markers are changed daily, they are recorded, and any errors can be corrected before being put into use on the desk.

News is very short this month; let's hope there will be something of interest for our next issue, until then

## POSTMARK SUPPLEMENT

The details shown in illustration ' $A$ ' are identical for January releases of Rabaul and hae (time incorporated) and Samarai, Madang, Kavieng and Konedobu postmarkers. (We have it on relatively good authority that a bundle of postmarkers held by Port Moresby Post Office, are also of identical pattern to Illustration ' $A$ ').

This system is a complete departure from previous postmarks eg:

Type 1 Burn \& Port Moresby
Type la Thu \& Popondetta
Type 2 Lac \& Port Moresby
It is only right that we should accept the postmark type-numbers as listed by Max Bulley, but we can make suggestions for amendment or addition.

The new postmarkers fall very closely within the category of Type 1 , but because of their regularity it would not be out of order to suggest that they be classified as a new type ie Type 3.

Unfortunately Max did not give us much room for expansion when in "Philately from Australia" (Sept 54) he labelled the postmarker from Port Moresby with time incorporated - "NEW TYPE".
With the introduction of "time" postmarkers, the January type number now calls for a sub-division.

We suggest that the postmarker with date only be Type 3 , and with time added to Type 3t.

The result of discussion between Max Bully and Ray Kelly has produced the following:

Type 1 As listed November Stamp News.


There are 5 postmarkers in use at Port Moresby, comprising 2 only Type 2 , and 3 only Type $2 a$.

## Money Order Office

The postmarker used on most FDCs (20 Oct 52) is the same as for Coronation Day Flight (2 June 53) cancelled in Sydney GPO, but it is different from any of those listed above.

This postmarker only seems to appear on special occasions. If by chance it is still in existence, let's hope it is brought into use in the near future for another special occasion.


Special Occasion Postmarker?

For those people interested, it is a Type $2 a$, almost identical to the postmarker currently in use on the General Council.

Incidently, Type 1, la, 3, $3 t$, Relief Nos $1-6$, Postage Paid at Port Moresby and Postal Dept (C 3 etc) P. $-N . G$ all measure approximately $30 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{mms}$ diameter, whereas the Type 2, La, and Port Moresby with time included (PMT) measure $29 \frac{1}{2} m m$ approximately.


To overcome the problem of "New Types", we recommend that the PMT postmark be known as Type $2 t$.

## Type $1 p$

With the accepted and suggested types now listed, we believe that all postmarkers excepting Reliefs and Postage Raids have been classified.

At the time of writing, there is only one relief in use. (MINJ), opened with Relief No 1 on 24 February 1956).

We will go a step further and suggest that the Postage Maids from Port Moresby (Dec 1946), Madangs, Rabaul and Lace 17 Aug and Samarai ( 14 Sept 51) be known as Type $1 p$.

## CORRECTIONS

It has been brought to our notice that the dates given in January Stamps News for the withdrawal of Relief No 3 from Samara ( 23 Jan 56 ) and Relief No 2 from Kavieng (24 Jan 56) were actually the dates received back in Port Moresby.

The correct date for the withdrawal of Relief No 3 and first use of new Samar ai postmarker was 19 January 1956.

With respect to Relief No 2 and new Kavieng postmarker, there is some doubt as to whether this was 16 January or 20 January. We now believe it was the 16 th: can anyone verify this date?

Our dates shown for Madang, Radaul (now known to be midday in date mentioned) and Le ( 2.30 pm ) are all correct.

A suggestion has been made that perhaps we were a bit hasty in putting into print our remarks on the Konedobu postmark.

It is strange that all copies received by us were as illustrated, yet many other collectors had perfect reproductions during the same period.


The Postal Dept found that a faulty section of counter (being used occasionally) was responsible for the illegible cancellations. This section has now been boycotted, hence the relatively clear copies now witnessed.

We also illustrate the Newspaper Postage Paid at Port Moresby, which until 10 February 1956 was relatively scarce. With the introduction of no "Official Free" mail, this postmark is now being used on Government Gazettes, etc and will become more plentiful.

These postmarkers were first used at Port Moresby, Madang, Rabaul and hae on 8th September 1950. Lea received a replacement postmarker which was put into use on 3rd November 1955.


The complete list of postmarkers from Papua and New Guinea is now:
Type 1, la, $1 p, 2,2 a, 3,3 t$ and Reliefs.
We shall be pleased to hear from any of our members with suggestions for amendment etc.
